The nature of the course



- Examination board: AQA
- Course contents:

- There is a study of a novel and film as part of the written exam.

Examination structure



- The AQA A level exam is in three parts.
- Paper 1 Listening, Reading and Writing (translation from French to English and English to French).
- Paper 2 Writing two essays in Spanish on the novel and film studied.
- Paper 3 Speaking a stimulus card on one of the A level topics; an Individual Research Project (IRP) on an aspect of modern life from el mundo hispanohablante.

With which subjects can it be combined?



- Spanish can be combined with all sorts of different A level subjects:
 History, Politics, Geography, English Literature, Theology, French,
 Psychology, Economics, Maths, Art, Business Studies, Sciences. The
 possibilities are endless.
- Spanish at A level develops excellent transferable thinking skills which can be applied across curriculum areas and used in Higher education and the workplace.
